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


KIDS CORNER

At our first dinner discussion we had over 60 people here for dinner, and 50 of them were interna-

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Learning Communities Partners with Local Schools to Help Students Prepare for Successful Futures

The Learning Communities Initiative (LCI) is partnering with schools in Ward 7, including Ronald H. Brown Middle School and Cesar Chavez Public Charter School, to support and enhance their efforts, most specifically by exposing middle school students to college and career options and encouraging them to dream about and prepare for successful futures.

A recent study done by Bridgespan, entitled "Double the Numbers", found that 43% of students in DC public schools graduate from high school within a 5 year period, as compared to 68% nationally; 29% enroll in a postsecondary educational program within 18 months, compared to 48% in the US; and 9% attain a postsecondary degree within 5 years, compared to 23% nationwide. The statistics in Southeast Washington, DC are lower than the citywide rates. In Wards 7 and 8, 33% of students finish high school, and 5% earn a postsecondary degree.

To address these disparities, we will be working with some great partners, particularly at Ron Brown, including Georgetown University's Institute for College Preparation academic enrichment program and Kids2College who offer early college awareness programming, the University of the District of Columbia's Cooperative Extension Service who will facilitate workshops for parents, the Black Student Union (BSU) at the University of Maryland, College Park who are helping us create opportunities for meaningful interaction between middle school and college students, and Parks and People who will run an environmental club. Along with these groups and others, we will be engaging students through assemblies, workshops, clubs, college and career tours, career days, community service opportunities, and enrichment field trips to help them expand their horizons; discover their interests, passions, and skills; build their confidence, and learn about college, careers, and vocational options.

A Final Word: Three Dimensions of Worship

Three is a significant number in the Bible. The trinity is made up of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. There were three disciples closer to Jesus than the rest (Peter, James, and John). Jesus rose from the grave after three days. Did you know that a three sided shape can handle more stress than other shapes? In fact, a diamond gets its strength from the three dimensional formation of carbon atoms.

Three is also significant in worship. James P. Gills tells us in "Dynamics of Worship" "Every interaction that a person experiences has...the following components: emotional (knowledge/ intimacy), cognizant (covenant/commitment), and motivational (worship/passion)". The more we know about God the closer we draw to Him (intimacy). So it is very important that we read our bibles and spend time with God.

We must also nurture our commitment to God.

In Rev. 2:4 the church at Ephesus is urged to remember their first love. There are times when we must do the same.

Why do we do what we do? Has our worship just become a routine or tradition? How is the motivational side of our worship doing? Are we passionate about God? "Passion cements the whole relationship into one cohesive bond. Trust grows during those moments, and (you) are able to express feelings otherwise unapproachable" (Gills). Passion should not be based on just emotion but also on your commitment.

I encourage you to review your worship and ask yourself— how do you rate in each of the areas (knowledge/intimacy, covenant/ commitment, and worship/passion)? Take stock of your worship.
